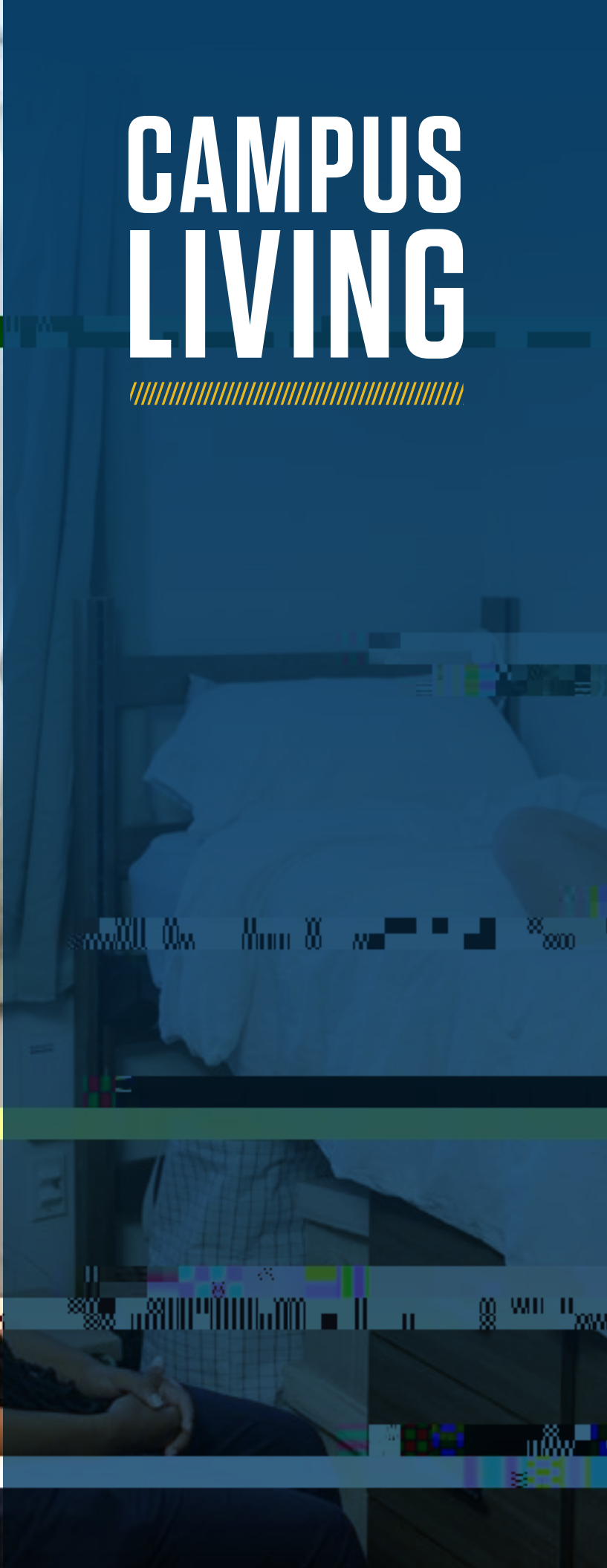

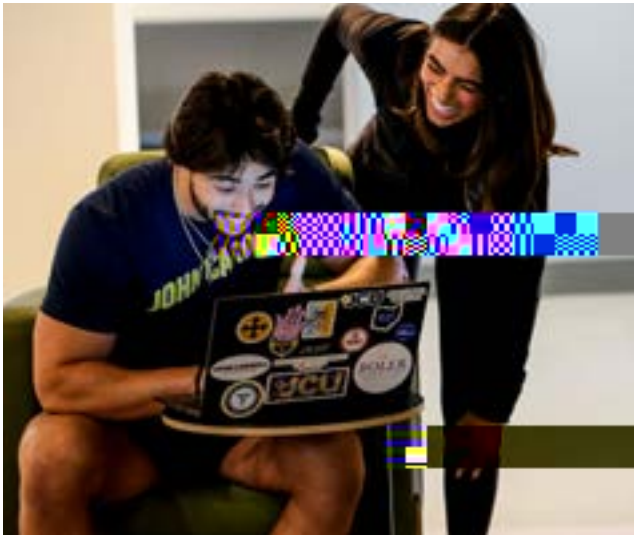




Step 2: ROOMMATE SELECTION

Opens April 1, 2024; closes June 14, 2024

Set up your My College Roomie (MCR) profile and complete the questionnaire to match with and choose your roommate.



Step 3: HOUSING ASSIGNMENTS

Step 1:

It all starts with the **Housing Application**, open to incoming first years at 3 p.m. on Wednesday, March 1, 2024 on the **Housing Portal**. You'll have three months to submit your application online. The application consists of a) signing the First Year Housing Agreement, b) answering personal preference questions, c) providing primary residence, emergency contact and medical information, d) logging living requests, and e) choosing your meal plan. **Complete your application by June 3, 2024.**

A. Signing the First-Year Housing Agreement

Read through the 2024-2025 Housing Agreement and Provisions for Occupancy closely before agreeing to its terms. Much like a lease, this is a binding document, so be sure you understand the details of your four-year University-sponsored housing commitment, and reach out with any questions.

B. Answering Personal Preference Questions

After signing the Housing Agreement, you'll answer a series of questions about sleep and study habits, cleanliness, hobbies and interests, if you're interested in and eligible for any of our three Living Learning Communities, and other details to help us match you with the best roommate for you. [Helicopter parent warning: please don't let a well-intentioned adult answer these for you. You know you best. Be honest with yourself when answering. You may hope to become an early riser or more organized in college, but if today you like sleeping in and are a little messy, that should be your answer!]

This section also includes optional emergency and medical questions you may need help answering, and we'll ask for your mobile phone carrier (Verizon, Sprint, etc) and phone number (yours,

not your parents', please). Personal preferences can be updated at any time in the Personal Information tab in the Housing Portal during or after submission.

C. Providing Primary Residence + Emergency Contact Information

We'll need at least one primary off-campus mailing address, an emergency contact, and contact info for one "Preferred Parent/Guardian" who will receive the Under 18 Verification if applicable, and all future Residential Life communications. These contacts are all updatable any time in the Personal Information tab in the Housing Portal during or after submission.

D. Logging Living Requests

First year students cannot request specific residence halls, but you can indicate whether you prefer a single or double occupancy room, double, mssigning each a priority number one (top choice) or two.

Singles and single occupancy rooms are limited, so we cannot guarantee your mssignment will match your request. The majority of students are placed in double-occupancy rooms. Please note that you won't be able to update your room request online once you submit—you'll need to contact the Office of Residence Life directly to make any changes.

E. Choosing Your Meal Plan

All first year students are required to enroll in a meal plan – you won't be able to submit your housing application until you choose one. There are two plans to pick from – **The 14 + \$150 Plan** or the **Unlimited Plan**. Both provide access to Schott Dining Hall, plus meal exchanges and Dining Dollars that can both be used at any of the five other on-campus dining and grab-and-go options: Saxby's, Inn Between, The Cubby, The Den, and The Nook.







Hamlin Hall

Located near the athletic fields and future Field House, Hamlin's double rooms house first years and sophomores. Community bathrooms and showers on every floor, kitchen, laundry + vending on the lower level, and TV + study lounges on each floor.

Campion Hall

Overlooking Braken Field and directly across the street from DeCarlo Varsity Center, Campion houses first years in double rooms with community bathrooms + showers, and lounges on each floor. Kitchen and laundry on the ground level.

Double Room: \$4,095/semester; \$8,190/year

(Buy-out): \$4,590/semester; \$9,180/year
